Spiritual Leadership

n the early 1960s, former Chrysler executive Lee lacocca popularized the saying, "Lead, follow, or get out of the way." While there is debate on who coined these words, there's no question they highlight lacocca's leadership approach.

It is easy for leaders to gravitate toward

this phrase. But one must ask, does this reflect the attitude of Jesus as a leader? Jesus told His disciples, "You know that the rulers of the Gentiles lord it over them, and their high

officials exercise authority over them. Not so with you" (Matthew 20:25-26, NIV). This is a striking statement of the contrast between spiritual and worldly leadership.

The apostle Paul focuses on three characteristics of spiritual leadership in Galatians 6:1-5. In this passage, he calls individuals "spiritual," or *neumatakoi* in Greek, meaning "ones who are spiritual." These are the spiritual leaders of the

church—and the first thing to set them apart is their ability to "restore" people who are found in a fault.

This word translated "restore" is *katartizete*, used in common Greek as a reference to resetting broken bones and in the New Testament for mending fishing nets. It means to repair something so it is functional again. People, because of sin, are broken off from the body of Christ. Spiritual leaders have the creativity to restore those who are "broken." Too often, religious people are known for judgmentalism, criticism, and condemnation. But a distinguishing characteristic of spiritual leadership is to gently and creatively "restore"

people back into the body of Christ.

The second thing Paul notes is spiritual leaders are humble. They don't think too highly of themselves. If leaders act as if they are above sin, they can develop pride that allows them to look down on people. Author Tevor Wax suggests, "As long as you keep looking up to God for salvation, you cannot look down on anyone else." Spiritual leaders don't look down on anyone, because they know that if it was not for the grace of God, they themselves would fall.

Finally, Paul says, spiritual leaders don't compare themselves to others. In John 21, Jesus discloses to Peter his future, stating, "Peter, you're going to love me, lead for me, and then

you're going to die for me." Peter immediately looks back at the apostle John and says, "What about him?" Then Jesus says, "What is that to you? You follow me."

Spiritual leaders understand that they are "fearfully and wonderfully made" (Psalm 139:14)—that God has given them a unique call and distinct spiritual gifts. They don't need to compare. Olympic runners never run looking back to see where

they are in comparison with others. Rather, they stay in their lane and keep their eye on the finish line. Spiritual leaders realize God has given them a lane in which to run, so they focus on Jesus, knowing that is the way to finish the race.

The church needs spiritual leaders who have the ability to creatively restore people who have been broken because of sin; who do not think too highly of themselves because they understand they, too, could fail, but for God's grace; and who refuse to compare themselves to others because they know God has designed, gifted, and empowered them to not only celebrate their own gifts but the gifts of others as well.

his March, local community organizations, the Mayor's office tasking the LAFD, and Councilwoman Monica Rodriguez and her staff all descended upon the Valley Crossroads church parking lot to provide Pfizer vaccinations for the residents of the 7th district (free of charge). March 2 marked the beginning of three weeks of vaccines made availabile to our 7th district, beginning with the City of Pacoima. Our church was the first of three vaccine locations, each operating for a duration of four to five days. A second dose of the vaccine would follow in three weeks' time.

In five days, the Valley Crossroads location administered an average of

manager of Los Angeles Union school (now L.A. Adventist Academy), SCC associate treasurer, lay associate pastor and youth pastor at Los Angeles Central church (now Los Angeles Central City church), and youth and young adult pastor at Rolling Hills church. Barksdale currently serves as senior pastor of the Miramonte and Maranatha churches.

This April, Barksdale's ordination spotlighted his calling to and passion for ministry. SCC President Velino A. Salazar and Executive Vice President James G. Lee shared words of encouragement, and Executive Secretary John H. Cress presented Barksdale with his credential. Cress prayed for the Spirit to join in the occasion, stating, "This is a moment, even out of all the busyness of life, even in the church life, in which all of heaven takes notice, as we set somebody aside into the gospel ministry."

"I got discouraged those first few years, but God in His mercy decided to tell me, 'Get up, Ira Barksdale! You may have fallen down, but get up, I still have something for you to do," he recalled.

"God has given me my best life," he continued. "I didn't know it was going to be possible; I had no idea."
