ho doesn't recall the famous childtelevision program "Mister Rogers' Neighborhood," with those unique songs "Won't You Be My

Velino A. Salazar, Neighbor?" and "It's Such a Good President Feeling" to open and close his 895 epi-

sodes, along with the statements "It is a wonderful day in this neighborhood," "You are my friend," "You are special because you are you," and "I like you just the way you are."

Millions of parents (including my wife and me) of Gen X and Millennial toddlers preferred their children watch this unparalleled educational program.

Among the many sayings Mr. Rogers repeated over and over through the episodes, "Life Is for Service" was the most popular, and he also used it in various college commencement speeches.

Did you know that Mr. Fred Rogers was an ordained Presbyterian minister (ventriloguist and vegetarian as well)? No wonder the topics he addressed in his half-hour segments were so important to parents when other children's programming avoided them and instead displayed competition, war, segregation, hostility, anger, etc. He encouraged children to be creative, honest, authentic, inclusive, amiable, and helpful. "Serve others and be kind" was his motto.

There is no doubt that the teachings of Jesus influenced Mr. Roger's philosophy of life, shaped his worldview, and motivated his work. Serving others is what Jesus taught and modeled many times and in different ways. His famous statement on serving others (Matthew 20:25-28, NIV) can be summarized from His comments about His mission: "just as the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve."

And, in Matthew 25:40 (NKJV), He explained how to serve others, relating such service to Himself: "Inasmuch as you did it to one of the least of these My brethren, you did it to Me."

Our conference leadership, following Jesus' mission, is inspired by Ellen G. White's statement on the purpose of the church: "The church is God's appointed agency for the salvation of men. It was organized for service, and its mission is to carry the gospel to the world" (The Acts of the Apostles, p. 9). We have chosen "Exalting Christ by serving others" as the motto

embers and volunteers from Vallejo Drive church spent a Sabbath in December engaging with the community of Glendale and beyond. Children, young adults, and adults distributed a total of 473 blankets, 400 hot vegetable soups, hundreds of socks, hygiene packages, sleeping mats, and candy canes to about 500 people.

Audrey Zorek, Vallejo Drive's children's ministry director, came up with the "Kids Connection Blanket Project" within the children's ministry program

as a way to teach kids how to care for those in need. He started asking for donations to purchase 200 blankets—\$8 each—at the end of October. With help from the congregation and Facebook friends, they raised enough money for 473 blankets.

In addition to the blanket, food, and clothing distribution, various out-reach initiatives took place throughout

the day. One group shared the Christmas spirit with staff, patients, and patients' families at Adventist Health Glendale by singing carols. Another group visited a local fire station to share homemade cookies with the firefighters and offer prayer

for both protection and gratitude. One of the ongoing outreach programs at Vallejo Drive includes helping children in need in Belize; this time, volunteers made Christmas cards for the children. A prayer group stayed at the church to pray for protection, for guidance, and for those served by each outreach team.

"Vallejo Drive church is becoming a church focused on reaching out to the community and sharing the love of Jesus," said Zorek. "Under our pastoral leadership, we are excited to continue

to minister to our community."

Vallejo Drive organizes a large outreach day each quarter, plus smaller outreach initiatives each month. Plans are already in the works to collaborate with other churches.

"I was very blessed when I saw my vision coming true as we reached those 400 plus people on the streets," said Zorek. "The best way to feel love is to share love."

Guitar Lessons at Light Above

his year, the Light Above Company has started offering free guitar lessons as part of its music ministry. While the students are primarily children and youth from the church, the free lessons are also a way to share the gospel with the community around the church.

Bob Cañete, the church's book-keeper and the lead guitar teacher, sees this as an important ministry opportunity. Cañete has been teaching guitar for more than 15 years. "It's the retention part," he says of this ministry. "It's the youth ministry and the music ministry as one."

The lessons are offered every Sabbath from 2-3 p.m. on the church campus. Four other teachers assist Cañete in teaching the students. As soon as the first lesson last month, there were already students participating from multiple churches.

The classes were designed for

beginners, starting with the basics, such as parts of the guitar, how to strum, and basic notes. Soon each student was able to play "Jesus Loves Me."

Each class has a corresponding video lesson. These videos include a tutorial as well as music sheets created for the guitar accompaniment to various hymns from our church hymnal. Check out these video lessons on YouTube; the channel name is "Light Above Classical Guitar Lessons."


