The *Heart* of the Father

begin with a simple proposition: Our Heavenly Father loves and values "the one." Which one? Anyone!

In Luke 15, we are confronted with a disturbing picture of God's church in Jesus' day, a church that was offended by Jesus "eating with" "tax collectors and sin-

ners." It makes one wonder, had the church in Jesus' day lost its sense of mission and purpose? Ellen White states on the first page of *Acts of the Apostles*, "The church is God's appointed

agency for the salvation of people." But by the way the church was complaining, one would wonder if it was really "tracking" with God. Had the church in Jesus' day become a cultural gathering of exclusive bigots under the umbrella of a "religious" organization? It appears that this group of people called

"the church" needed the "Rabbi" to reframe their theology.

So, Jesus used storytelling to teach His church about God's inclusive love...the Shepherd so loved the sheep that He went after it, the woman so valued the coin that she searched for it, and the Father so loved the son that He lovingly received him.

Friends, God so loves the world, and not just one sector of it. Sometimes in our passion for being "end-time" zealots, is it possible we forget that "doing right" must always be preceded by "being right" with Him and one another? The commitment of "being" and "doing" in Him must always align. Jesus' and Paul's teachings reflect such a connectivity (refer to "being" right in the Beatitudes of Matthew 5 and 1 Corinthians 13).

I can't help but think that Jesus spending time with the tax

collectors and sinners is what prompted all of the accusations hurled at him. "How could a man of God 'hang with' sinners?" they may have asked. "You see what happens to teachers when they don't attend the accredited rabbinical schools? You see what happens when teachers don't hang with 'established' church people? They start hanging with sinners, and before you know, they too become comfortable with sin, and the integrity of the church is compromised!"

But oh, were they wrong. Even though Jesus was comfortable with sinners, He was never "comfortable" with sin. For Jesus called out sins, especially with the church leaders of His day—the sins of pride of pedigree and social status,

giving offerings to God from revenue taken from the poor, personal enrichment that stemmed from judicial injustices, and more. Jesus had no problem dealing with weightier sins. Unfortunately, many of His religious leaders had sanitized the sins which God most abhorred (Micah 6:8).

But, friends, there's no need to dwell on the negative. Since we are all in need of a Savior, Jesus "hanging" around sinners gives hope to all, both religious and non-religious. God's incarnational commitment reveals that we all have hope in Him. His comfort level with us "while we are yet sinners" invites us all to audaciously believe there is hope in Christ!

Let us ask: Have we experienced the heartbeat of Jesus on a daily basis so that we will share His love? Or has our sanitized Christianity become an exclusionary demonstration? What intentional, prayerful steps will we take to meet, mingle, and minister with others? After all, love is not an event but an adventure-filled journey of walking in lockstep with God.

Friends, God so loved the world, so let us begin by loving "the one," anyone who stands before us!

"Women are drawn to the annual spiritual retreat for spiritual refreshment, growth, and bonding," said Gloria Huerta, Hispanic Women's Ministries president. "It provides a safe haven for non-Adventist women to enjoy Christian camaraderie in a beautiful setting, to learn about Jesus, and ultimately have the desire to walk with Him day by day."

With breakout sessions, morning walks, united worship, and more, this retreat provided spiritual refreshment and community. The retreat also

featured a war room, a new addition this year. Modeled after the sanctuary, the room offered an opportunity to personally experience the meaning of each emblem. "Tears were shed and lives were changed," Huerta said. "Many visitors had a hands-on experience of the sanctuary, a key fundamental belief of our faith."

Women's Ministry committee member Miriam Hernandez brought five visitors to the retreat; each left with "overwhelming gratitude," she said. One particular attendee, Emerita, prayed at the retreat that the Lord would come into her heart. Hernandez remembered, "Emerita came with a hunger and thirst to find Jesus. She found Him."

in, and I cannot." Jeremiah 20:9 (English Standard Version). "Many times in my life, I tried to walk away from God and His calling, but no matter how far I ran or how hard I tried to not preach, God wouldn't let me get away," Hicks said.

While John Cress, SCC Ministerial Director, was unable to attend, a message from him was read. He addressed both the joy and the challenges that come with ministerial work, adding, "Such is your calling and, in a sense, the calling of all of us. 'You will be hard pressed, but not crushed; perplexed, but not in despair; persecuted, but not abandoned; struck down, but not destroyed.' Why? Because, as Paul puts it in 2 Corinthians 4:7-12, 'Life is at work in you.' Whose life? Christ's — and that is all you need, my friend!"

Colleagues shared in songs of blessing and participated in the ordination prayer. "Adam throws himself into the friendships he is called to minister through," shared Pastor Branden Stoltz, Hollywood and Burbank churches. "Adam isn't afraid of the gritty parts of life or complicated questions that come from people from all walks of life. I've been blessed to be able to have parallel ministries to his since college years!"

"I am humbled beyond words that God has called me to ministry, in partnership with the priesthood of all believers," Elder Hicks said. "This ordination, this calling is no more mine than my narrative is. It belongs to all of us who are spreading the gospel to all the world."

Hispanic Women's Ministries

uch can happen in 30 years. For the Southern California Conference Women's Ministries, 2018 marks the anniversary of the ministry's founding in 1989.

Pastor James W. Zackrison, the founding director, could never have imagined the impact this ministry would have throughout the churches in SCC's territory. In the words of Moses: "And in the wilderness where you saw how the Lord your God carried you, as a man carries his son, in all the way that you went until you came to this place" Deuteronomy 1:31 (New King James Version).

Since 2016, the ministry has hosted a heart health convocation, free to all attendees. This event has attracted nearly 900 women each year. The ministry has also broadened its community outreach by

providing emergency kits to homeless shelters, domestic violence shelters, and women prisoners of the L.A. County jail. "The charge is: Connect with your community," said Gloria Huerta, Hispanic Women's Ministries president. "Find a need and fill it. Quoting Albert Schweizer: The purpose of human

life is to serve and show compassion and the will to help others.' That is what Jesus did. That is what we are called to do. That is our mission."

Huerta said the hope is to continue involving more young women and teens. "Women's Ministries has a place for them," Huerta said. "We need them."

"We have mothers come to us in tears of gratitude, saying, 'Thank you for what you are doing for our daughters,"' Huerta commented. "We say, 'Thank you Lord for what You are doing for Your daughters!"
