A Greater Thirst

t Jacob's well, Jesus stops to rest. He is tired from his travels, hungry and thirsty. His disciples have left to find food in the nearby city of Samaria while Jesus asks for a drink of water from a local Samaritan woman. After a simple life-changing conversation with

Jesus, the Living Water, this woman leaves her water pot and runs back into Samaria to bring others to Jesus! In *The Desire of Ages*, we read, "This woman represents the working of a practical faith in Christ. Every true disciple is born into the kingdom of God as a missionary. He who drinks of the living

water becomes a fountain of life. The receiver becomes a giver" (p. 195). When you have met Jesus, you share Jesus — it's just that simple.

Meanwhile, the disciples have returned with food. "Rabbi, eat something!" is their urgent request. Jesus looks at them and simply says "I have a kind of food you know nothing about" (John 4:31-32, NLT). The disciples begin to wonder if someone else had brought Him food, completely missing the point. Jesus makes it even more clear to them: "My food is to do the will of Him who sent me, and to finish His work" (John 4:34, NKJV). Jesus had a greater hunger for more than physical food. It was a hunger for people to experience the water of life! "He saw her drinking of the water of life, and His own hunger and thirst were satisfied. The accomplishment of the mission which He had left heaven to perform strengthened the Saviour for His labor and lifted Him above the necessities of humanity" (The Desire of Ages, p. 190-191).

Then Jesus says, "Do you not say, There are still four months and then comes the harvest? Behold, I say to you, lift up your eyes and look at the field, for they are already white for harvest!" (John 4:35, NKJV). Here, Jesus seeks to open the eyes of his disciples to the field of labor the woman had already begun to work in. "As soon as she had found the Saviour the Samaritan woman brought others to Him. She proved herself a more effective missionary than His own disciples. The disciples saw nothing

in Samaria to indicate that it was an encouraging field. Their thoughts were fixed upon a great work to be done in the future. They did not see that right around them was a harvest to be gathered. But through the woman whom they despised, a whole cityful were brought to hear the Saviour. She car-

ried the light at once to her countrymen" (The Desire of Ages, p. 195). The disciples were waiting for a future work, missing the opportunities directly in front of them!

In John 4, Jesus calls out to humanity, claiming that while everything else in the world will leave you thirsty, He will truly satisfy. The passage further illustrates the fact that you can't experience Jesus without sharing Him. Has the living water satisfied your thirst?

Seeing Jesus in this story makes me stop and think, *Do I have a hunger for souls like He has?* Even though Jesus was tired and hungry, this encounter was more satisfying than physical food. He looked around Him and saw an immediate harvest. *Am I focusing so much of my time planning for some future work that I neglect the harvest of today?* While plans for the future are good, opportunities to share the Living Water are right around us. Let our prayer be: *Open our eyes to see the harvest of today. Fill our hearts with You and a hunger for souls like you had, Jesus!*

Building Appropriations SCC Makes Progress

SCC Makes Progress Toward Satisfying Building Appropriations

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SCC Satisfies Building Appropriations

hen a church buys their first building, they receive what is referred to as a building appropriation from the conference office. The purpose of this non-tithe money is to assist churches throughout the process of purchasing their first building.

The appropriation sum awarded to the church covers the purchase or construction of the church's first building facility.

The list of churches with outstanding building appropriations has grown over the years, and those still on the list have been patiently waiting. There have been small sums given to some of the churches while they are waiting for the appropriation to be satisfied in full.

"We are developing a plan to satisfy several per year from the list," said Orville Ortiz, SCC treasurer. In 2016, 28 churches in the conference had unsatisfied appropriations. Many of these appropriations have been unsatisfied for more than 10, sometimes even more than 20, years. In the last two years, though, more than five churches have seen their building appropriations satisfied as they have received the last of the outstanding sum.

Earlier this year, Ortiz visited Paramount Spanish church to deliver the remaining \$60,000 of their promised appropriation. The congregation had been waiting since 1995 to receive their full appropriation, and Ortiz delivered the check to the church pastor and treasurer during the morning worship service.

Also satisfied within the last two years were building appropriations for West Hollywood Spanish church, Temple City Spanish church, Altadena church and Valley Crossroads church.

The remaining churches will see their appropriations satisfied from the oldest to the most recent in the coming years. To the churches still waiting, Ortiz says, "We are fulfilling the commitment we've made to you."

During her tenure at Vallejo Drive church, Remboldt accompanied 1,150 worship services, 2,300 congregational

and choir accompaniments, 3,400 solos and 29 Christmas programs.

Remboldt was honored by her colleagues and congregation on March 24, 2018, during the Sabbath morning worship service. Those who have worked closely with Remboldt, both from within and outside the church, shared comments about their experience serving with her in various capacities.

Ladd Thomas has served as the organist at the First United Methodist Church of Glendale for 58 years. He proudly shared the bench with Remboldt for 10 years, saying, "I always thought, 'Liz is going to have a beautiful ministry,' because you love it so much, and that love is freely given." Thomas and Remboldt often filled in for one another at their respective churches during vacations or other absences.

During her 29 years of ministry at Vallejo Drive church, Liz commuted from Hanford, Santa Maria, and Simi Valley. Driving from Simi Valley, Remboldt would wake up at 4 a.m. to make it to the church at 7 a.m. to practice. This is evidence of her dedication and love for the ministry.

John St. Marie worked alongside Remboldt for the last five years of her tenure after he joined Vallejo Drive church as the choir director. "She chooses pieces with such devotion because she wants to make worship here a beautiful space," he commented.

The emotional tribute was an appropriate "thank you" for Remboldt's years of service. Remboldt quoted the famous baseball announcer Vin Scully, who said, "Don't be sad that it's over, be glad that it happened." Her take? "I'm very glad the last 29 years happened."

dventist Community Services (ACS) is a vital ministry. Disaster response is a portion of ACS that provides assistance in the event of a natural or manmade disaster or unforeseen tragedy. This assistance takes many forms, including volunteer clean-up and rebuilding services as well as supplies and food distributed to those who have been affected by a tragedy. Disaster could strike at any time, and we must be prepared to offer immediate assistance to those in need.

Last year, we distributed yellow ACS Disaster Response plastic buckets at pastors' and Executive Committee meetings and requested that these buckets be filled with the following items and returned to the conference office: bleach, sponges, scrub brush, cleaning towels, laundry detergent, dishwashing soap, clothesline and clothespins, dust masks, gloves,

trash bags, insect repellent spray, air freshener and more. Many of these items can be found at the Dollar Store. Visit https://scc.adventist.org/cleanupkits for details on quantities needed.

We must have these clean-up kits on hand now, before a disaster happens. If your church

has one of these buckets, please call SCC ACS at 818-546-8405 or bring it by the office. Thank you for your assistance in this ministry!

Lastly, please stay tuned for details regarding a future Disaster Response training. Our goal is to have more than 2,000 members trained throughout SCC in

the event of federal disaster. Because the certification expires after two years, it is important to become retrained regularly. For those who have never been trained and are interested, please watch for more information about this event.
