The Root of Disappointment

So where does disappointment come from? That is precisely what Elijah was trying to figure out shortly after God led him to call fire from heaven to prove to the people that Yahweh was the one true God. What he did next was just as impressive as

he prayed earnestly until rain began to

fall, ending a three-year drought. Psalm 104:3 (NASB 1995)

reads, "He lays the beams of His upper chambers in the waters; He makes the clouds His chariot; He walks upon the wings of the wind." In those days, many believed that God was traveling from place to place in the clouds and wind. Yet, during the three-year drought, the belief was that God was quite absent from Israel. So, when the rain started to fall, it was a powerful confirmation that God's presence had returned.

Elijah believed that this strong showing of God's power would be enough to change the heart of King Ahab, who had allowed the evil Queen lezebel to lead the people astray. 1 Kings

18:45-46 (NKJV) says, "Now it happened in the meantime that the sky became black with clouds and wind, and there was a heavy rain. So Ahab rode away and went to Jezreel. Then the hand of the Lord came upon Elijah; and he girded up his loins and ran ahead of Ahab to the entrance of Jezreel." As heavy rain fell and he led the king's procession back to the palace, Elijah began to believe that Ahab would now become faithful

to God and stand up to the queen. Unfortunately, when the king caved in to the queen, Elijah became very disappointed and ran away, fearing for his life. His disappointment with the king, and likely even with God, led him to run away from a pivotal moment.

In a little-known passage, Ellen White laments Elijah's decision to run away. She says, "Had he remained where he was, had he made God his refuge and strength, standing steadfast for the truth, he would have been shielded from harm. The Lord would have given him another signal victory

by sending His judgments on Jezebel; and the impression made on the king and the people would have wrought a great reformation" (*Prophets and Kings*, p. 160).

Elijah's disappointment caused him to miss his big moment that would have led him to fulfill his mission to cause revival throughout the land. The important work he was doing got derailed because his assumptions about how things should have gone did not happen as he wished they would. That is where disappointment with God often comes from. Disappointment with God and

comes from. Disappointment with God stems from misalignment with God and His ways. Sometimes things don't happen as we think they should and we allow disappointment to creep into our lives. We need to remember that God is able to work all things together for good. We need to abide in Christ so that our will and His will becomes aligned as one—until our vision of life is transformed into seeing things from God's perspective and

After 27 years serving as pastor of the El Monte Vietnamese church, Vinh Nguyen joined the Southern California Conference office team as the director of the Asian-Pacific Region in November. In this role, he

will oversee the 33 churches representing 11 languages (including English) within our Asian-Pacific Region.

Nguyen's number one passion in ministry is to reach the local Asian-Pacific immigrant communi-

> ty, a work to whichhe has dedicated many y e a r s . " M y greatest passion in ministry is to evan-

gelize the Asian-Pacific refugees and immigrants throughout the greater Los Angeles area," he shared. "For many, this will be the first time to ever be exposed to Christianity."

Nguyen has been active in ministry for the Vietnamese community for decades in various capcities with many innovative projects. "I currently serve as a Vietnamese Coordinator for all the Vietnamese churches in NAD territory," Nguyen shared. "I started the Vietnamese Voice of Hope Ministry, which is comprised of the printing press work and the media ministry. I also developed a tutoring center (Vietnamese Adventist Education Center) to connect with the community. I developed the first Vietnamese evangelism school in North America."

His greatest hope for his work in this position is "to see lay people, especially young adults, equipped and mobilized to witness in every moment and everywhere for Jesus Christ."

"I hope that God will bless our Asian-Pacific region to be united in one mission to share the everlasting gospel to every language in the Los Angeles area," Nguyen continued. "Through this process, I would like to see church planting among the unreached people groups."

Los Angeles native, Salvador Garcia is no stranger Southern California Conference (SCC). He has pastored 12 churches in SCC and also shared youth week of prayer with multiple other churches and SCC schools.
